FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

It is getting close to the end of summer, and we will soon have completed two thirds of the current year. It has been, and continues to be, one of the most confusing and bewildering years our congregation has experienced. Through all that has happened, Central has provided worship services, been available to those in need, and attempted to maintain some form of contact with our members and friends. But as we all know, organizations, including churches, cannot operate on good intentions alone. So it is an appropriate time to review our finances.

First, a note of appreciation to the members and friends who have maintained, as best they can, their regular contributions through the mail, delivering it to the church office or some other means.

Central, in anticipation of not being able to hold Sunday services, instituted some cost savings measures, including a reduction of employee hours in an attempt to keep expenditures as low as possible. The finance numbers at the end of June indicate church expenses are at 48% of the yearly budget. It is expected as we enter the fall and winter seasons expenses will show an increase.

Income through June is at 39% of budget. This may be a verification that being unable to have regular services in the sanctuary has impacted both the pledged and unpledged contributions. Hopefully, with the reopening of our Sunday worship service inside the church and a decrease in the number of individuals testing positive for COVID 19 locally, our financial figures will improve.

The Finance Committee requests that each member and friend prayerfully consider reviewing their pledge or contribution at this time. In addition, it is suggested we keep in our prayers our church, our country and those who hold responsible positions in the various levels in our governments.

NO-YEAST DINNER ROLLS

2 eggs

½ cup sour cream

½ cup milk

1/4 cup + 2 tbsp. COLD butter

2 cups flour

/2 Cup IIIIK

1 ½ teaspoon baking powder

½ teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon salt

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Spray 12 muffin cups with non-stick spray and set aside

Whisk together dry ingredients and set aside

Crack eggs into bowl and whip. Add sour cream and milk and whisk until smooth.

Whisk ½ of the flour mixture into egg mixture. Pour remaining (1 cup) flour into the bowl.


Grate 1/4 cup COLD butter on top of the flour. Use a rubber scraper to stir mixture until just combined. Dough will be sticky. Spray a spoon with the non-stick spray and scoop dough out and into the 12 muffin cups. Use about 4 tbsp. of dough per cup.

Dice remaining 2 tbsp. butter and add a small square to the top of each roll.

Bake 20-22 minutes. Serve warm, brushed with additional butter and topped with jam.

(This spring when yeast wasn't readily available in the grocery stores, I came across this recipe and gave it a try. The rolls are good, but just a bit bland. But, if you break them in half, after baking of course, and garnish them with a nice glob of jelly, they're great - yum.)




The Moran Family

Grandparents are Kelley & Marla Bunker and Eli & Debra Moran.




NEWS FROM FAMILY MINISTRY


