MISSIONS/OUTREACH

The Mitten Tree is located just inside the Court Street entrance by the elevator with a basket awaiting your donations. Just stop by and bring your donations of mittens, caps, and socks. These are all very much needed. They go to our local elementary schools, the middle school, the Diane Pepler Shelter and the local men's and women's New Hope homes. Very small sizes are brought to the Early Head Start Program at Avery Square. They are much appreciated and needed.

Our **Backpack Program** is now caring for **32** families from Lincoln School. This is the largest number we have ever been called upon to serve, and a very large amount of food is required. Children from these families are sent home with backpacks of food every Friday, which will help tide them over the weekend. Food items are bought from Feeding America, but dry cereal has not recently been available, so some cereal and bread have been bought locally. Peanut butter is a very wanted item. Yes, in Sault Ste. Marie, sadly, there are children who go hungry! How can we help?? Please help by your donation of money through Central's Mission program. Mail in your donation or drop it off at the church office. Be sure to mark on your check "Backpack Program."

CRUNCHY BEEF CASSEROLE

2 cups uncooked curly rotini pasta	1# ground beef
1 can (16 oz.) cream of mushroom soup	1 can (14 oz.) tomatoes (I prefer the diced)
3/4 cup Cheddar cheese	1/4 to 1/2 cup green pepper, diced (optional)
3/4 teaspoon seasoned salt	1 can (3 oz.) Durkee fried onions



Cook pasta as directed. Drain and set aside. Brown the beef and drain any fat. Combine all ingredients except the Durkee onions. Pour into a 2 quart greased casserole. Cover and bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Uncover, top with Durkee onions and bake another 3 minutes. Enjoy! You just might want more for leftovers!

Are you looking for an opportunity to share your love and abundance? In prior issues of the Flame, we shared that Central and Algonquin have initiated a Fresh Expressions team. Our primary focus is to look for new opportunities to walk with people in our community. We are listening and asking questions. We are building relationships. We will be working with people as soon as the pandemic has abated. In the meantime, we can help by providing support to the Great Lakes Recovery Center's New Hope Houses for both men and women.

Volunteers who cleaned out the Central Child Care Center assembled a tub of items including diapers, wipes, and other baby supplies that were on hand in the center and delivered those supplies to the New Hope House for women. Members of both churches have donated clothing, toiletries, and bedding to the New Hope Houses for both the men's and the women's centers. Thank you all for your donations that strengthen our relationship with New Hope.

If you would like to help the Fresh Expressions team provide support to the New Hope Houses, please consider purchasing any items on the list. Items can be dropped off at Central UMC during office hours. Please indicate on them that they are for New Hope.

Here is a list of things their residential clients typically need:

- Full size toiletries (shampoo, soap, toothbrush, toothpaste, etc.)
- masks
- socks
- twin size bedding (regular, not XL), pillowcases
- bath towels
- casual clothing, T-shirts, sweats
- Backpacks or totes; many of the residents arrive with nothing but a garbage bag to carry their belongings.

The women's house allows clients to have their children with them, so diapers and gently used clothing for babies and children are always appreciated too.

Cash donations can also be made. Make checks out to Central UMC and indicate "New Hope" on them. We will use the cash to purchase items from the list to round out the donations.


